In terms of practical support many of our Churches are involved with Food Banks who are providing an essential resource at this time. Others have volunteered to shop for neighbours and have been placing leaflets through doors offering to help if needed. Numerous phone calls are made throughout the day offering pastoral support.

We don't know for how long the restrictions will continue and we need to pace and prepare ourselves for the medium term. At a time when many in our local communities are anxious and afraid, the Church, now more than ever, has an opportunity to be seen beyond its four walls.

As we respond to this desperate situation, let's do what we can, to love, support and care for each other in a way that honours Christ and actively demonstrates the abundance of life given to us in Jesus.

## **'Welcome to Wales' – first mission workers arrive in Llanelli!**

Sunday 5th January was both a special and historic service in Gobaith church, Llanelli. During the service the congregation welcomed a new mission worker and family to support the work in Gobaith sponsored by the Baptist Union of Wales.

Nana & Sungsu Paek are from Seoul, Korea. They have come to Wales with their three daughters Seowon (13), Seojin (11) and Seoa (6) who are are now settling into school in Llanelli. After the service the members welcomed the family with special Korean snacks, Welsh cakes and of course a 'cup of tea'!

Both Nana & Sungsu have felt a strong call to serve God in Wales for some time and had been serving in Llanelli during 2017-2018. Sungsu is a pastor and his wife Nana, a pastoral worker. It was during their time in Wales that they came to love the church at Gobaith and when they had to return to Korea in 2018 felt sure they would return.

Since the Baptist Union of Wales registered as a Sponsor for Religious Workers with the UK VISA and Immigration service much work has been put in place to make possible what we now know as 'reverse mission'. Where Wales once sent missionaries overseas like Robert Jermaine Thomas and Timothy Richard, we recognise our need for mission at home in Wales. As a mission worker, Nana & Sungsu raise all their own support and are sustained by their sending church. They serve us here in Wales, trusting God will provide for them.

## "Pray without Ceasing"

This year the Baptist Union of Wales is encouraging churches and individuals to make 2020 a Year of Prayer.

As we begin a new decade, the Mission Board felt the need for a renewed emphasis on prayer. As Christians, we believe in the power of prayer and that faithful, persistent prayer really does make a difference. The idea of setting apart a year of prayer was well received in the hope that churches across Wales would respond and unite as one Baptist family to pray for God's work in Wales.

During the year prayer packs which include a variety of resources, ideas and suggestions to help encourage congregations to pray together, will be provided to all churches and ministers. The campaign began in December with the provision of the first prayer pack "Prayers of Waiting" for use during Advent and New Year. This was followed by a second pack "Prayers of Preparation" providing prayers and resources for use during Lent, St David's Day and Easter. Further packs will follow for use at Pentecost and Harvest.

If you truly believe in the power of prayer, then please pray and keep on praying! That was the challenge given to Baptist churches in Gwent as they concluded a special 24-hour prayer event with a service of prayer and praise at Tabernacle, Newbridge on 25<sup>th</sup> January.

Organised by the Revd. Jonathan Forman (Blaenau Gwent, Abertillery) on behalf of the Gwent Baptist Association, the around-the-clock prayer drive was just one of a number of initiatives the Association has planned to mark 2020 designated by the Baptist Union of Wales as a Year of Prayer.

The aim is for all of us in the Baptist "family" to seek God and His guidance as churches and chapels face ever-growing challenges in this secular society in which we live.

Jonathan produced an easy-to-use prayer pack with Bible readings and prayer suggestions for each of the 24 hours with special attention being given to how David was able to maintain an intimate relationship with God through the ups and downs of his life as underlined by Psalm 23. Some churches chose to hold extended prayer sessions while others selected specific slots during the period. BUW Director of Mission, the Revd Simeon Baker gave an all-Wales perspective on prayer needs at the final service and highlighted the exciting development of new "reverse missionaries" - from countries which we once thought of as the overseas mission field - arriving to serve our churches. Tim Moody, assistant pastor at Moriah Baptist Church, Risca, focused on the need to pray for the churches in Gwent. "If you really believe in the power of prayer, then please pray and keep on praying!!", he said.

Jonathan said: "It was great that we could all pray with one heart as we seek to better serve God and the Lord Jesus Christ."

### **Pembrokeshire Prayer Breakfast 2020**



The shone brightly sun in Wolfscastle on Saturday morning, 29<sup>th</sup> February for the Pembrokeshire Prayer Breakfast. This was the third Welsh language Prayer Breakfast organised in Pembrokeshire and was attended by approximately 115 people. Following a delicious Welsh breakfast, worship was led by the special guests, the Reverend Dr Rhys Llwyd and his wife, Dr Menna Machreth Llwvd. It was a privilege to pray for situations within the County and particularily the agriculture, education, and health sectors. Prayer was also offered for the precarious state of Christian witness.

Rhys, a minister at Caersalem Caernarfon, Calfaria Penygroes and Ebenezer Llanllyfni, has been in ministry there for nearly ten years. He presented a warm, challenging and humorous address. He referred to our responsibility of holding on to our confidence in Jesus Christ's Gospel, without any shame whatsoever, in the assurance that God is still at work in Wales. This was his exhortation:-

"Do not remember the former things,

Nor consider the things of old.

Behold, I will do a new thing,

Now it shall spring forth! Shall you not know it?

I will even make a road in the wilderness and rivers in the desert." (Isaiah 43:18-19)

After the address, there was a time of prayer, before concluding with Lewis Valentine's hymn, "Dros Gymru'n gwlad, O Dad, dyrchafwn gri." Some of the comments made by those present: "Everyone enjoyed the speaker and the bacon!" "A special morning, thank you very much – have eaten too much" "a good and convenient setting", "I enjoyed the breakfast very much," "excellent to hear a young preacher speak so well!"

The Alltyrafon Hotel stands under a huge rock shelter, which is very similar to a wolf raising its head to greet the moon. It is the shape of the rock that has given the village the name "Wolfscastle". As Christians, we are not wolves raising our voices to the moon, but children greeting our heavenly father, with confidence in his loyalty and justice.

Thursday morning saw a hundred

guests gather for breakfast in the Pierhead building, to be transported back in time to appreciate the spectacular history of the building.

The occasion was enriched by short but purposeful speeches by Rebecca Evans, AM, the Rt Hon Simon Hart MP and the Most Reverend John Davies. Archbishop Wales. of Prayers were an important part of the programme, with an emphasis on the contemporary events of our day. Fitting musical performances of high standard were given by "Sound of Wales" and singers Huw and Elizabeth Priday.

## Saundersfoot Ministers Conference 2020 Introducing Cameron Roxburgh & Forge Cymru



In the only week of dry weather in February, two groups of Ministers and Leaders travelled to Saundersfoot for the annual conference. This year was special in that we had the largest number of people attending the English speaking conference and for the first time in Saundersfoot, a Welsh speaking Ministers conference was held with a good number attending.

Our main speaker for both conferences was Cameron Roxburgh from Vancouver, Canada. Cam is part of the Forge network involved in helping denominations and churches globally to think seriously about mission in a changing world. For his theme, Cam shared with us that the foundation for any mission is the underpinning theology. Speaking from 1 Peter 2:9-10, his talks covered the topics of identity, character and vocation and how that relates to the missional nature of God.

It was a privilege getting to know Cam and to hear of his Welsh roots in Abergavenny and Pentreuchaf, Pwllheli. We appreciated his humble and honest engagement with both conferences as he explained that mission is not a quick fix but flows out of our understanding of God. We are looking forward to further conversations with Cam as churches across Wales are invited to join in further training that will start in September.

"Regarding Saundersfoot, as always I appreciate the relaxed atmosphere, good food and accommodation, and the way the programme allows plenty of time between

sessions to catch up with old friends and make new ones. Some conferences fill all the available time with input of one sort or another, but I think Saundersfoot has the balance just right. Regarding Cameron, I was very pleased with what I saw and heard. We can all be a bit wary about so-called experts from overseas, but I felt Cameron came across as someone whose experience can be relevant to our situation, and from whom we can learn a great deal. I particularly appreciated his emphasis on how the church needs to reflect the image of God, rather than jumping straight into church growth. I look forward to hearing and learning more from Cam in the coming months." *Revd Ifor Williams*
