PRAYER FOR OUR WELSH SPEAKING CHURCHES

Impressions of a Prayer Meeting led by Derek Rees, Isaias Grandis and Rhun Murphy by Arwel E Jones, Caernarfon, someone who didn't really want to be there!

Sometimes, if we're honest, we have a tendency to do things out of duty rather than love or enthusiasm and that indeed was my experience on Tuesday, 23 June. Our mid-week meeting in Caersalem, Caernarfon had been postponed as an online prayer meeting had been organized by the Baptist Union of Wales and we were duty bound to join in! With little energy and few expectations we dutifully logged on to the meeting and to our great surprise we experienced a number of remarkable blessings!

Firstly, it was good to see some familiar faces at a time when we are all having to keep our distance from each other. But, and with all due respect to friends who were at the meeting, it was even better to see a number of new faces. In our small Welsh-speaking Christian circles we tend to think that if we're not related to everybody then at least we know everybody or to whom they are related! We thank God that His mind and plans are greater and more expansive than we could ever imagine and that He works across our country among people we do not yet know. Secondly, we worshipped together, although that sounds like a strange thing to say at a time when we cannot meet in the same place! Being part of worship led from Carmarthen, Swansea and Caernarfon was a privilege and there was a real sense of worshipping together – regardless of the geographical distance. We were brought together into the presence of the Heavenly Father who welcomes his children with such grace and compassion. We were led to think and pray for various areas and people, from our country's youth to the most vulnerable, from the future of our diverse churches and the nature of our mission to a world that really needs to hear about "a vibrant hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead". Praying together – yes, the word "together" emerges again – if the gates of hell cannot defeat the church, what hope do a few miles distance and a poor internet link have!!! Some will ask what difference prayer makes but the Bible makes two things very clear. First, our Lord wants us to pray -"Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God." Although not every answer to prayer is exactly what we would like to hear.

Secondly, prayer changes us. How can we come into the presence of our Lord who gave His life for us without being changed ourselves? change is a must, now and whenever we get into some sort of new normality. No doubt, we as the people of God, will need to do some things differently and we shall see, over time, what that means in practice. But the most important change will be, if we as His people allow Him to change us to be disciples who give way to Him, to serve Him truly and act on His behalf in a broken and destitute country and communities. Well, that's something to pray for, and not only when we're in the mood but when everything feels like a duty!

BACK TO NORMAL?

For many it has felt like a long wait before being able to worship again in the chapel building. For some it can't come quickly enough and for others there are understandable concerns about continuing to stay safe, especially in the winter months.

However you feel, one thing that will be true for both is that things will not go fully back to normal for a while. For some of our chapels, the space available will restrict numbers able to attend; we know that singing is not permitted at the moment; social distancing will limit opportunties for community and conversation. Perhaps going to chapel on Sunday will feel more like the waiting room at the dentist rather than the familiar friendly gatherings? Can worship be sanitised and sterile?

Of course wanting to 'get back to normal' is a perfectly natural response. There is comfort in the familiar. Like a favourite armchair that we've sat in for years, it has become moulded to just the way we like it! But it's worth asking the question, was the way we worshipped together working that well anyway? It might have been comfortable for me and my needs, but was it working for those who weren't coming to worship?

During this period of lock down a number of churches have found that being forced out of the building has connected them with a much greater number of people. People who would never attend a chapel on Sunday, have found a safe place to join a service. For the housebound or people with disabilities – suddenly church has become more inclusive and accessible. Working families with all kinds of Sunday commitments have found it easier to sit down as a family and worship together when the one hour slot on Sunday never quite worked. Suddenly the wider connections we prayed for before lock down have become possible.

Long before the Covid-19 pandemic, many of us in our churches have been living in our safe, comfortable Christian bubble. Maybe it's time to burst that bubble and get back to sharing the abundant and all transforming life of Jesus with our neighbours and friends. We may not yet know what the 'new normal' will look like, but before we rush back to our building, maybe it's worth asking the question, is there anything we need to take with us as we relearn how to be church?

To consider:

- 1. If we had to do face this all over again what would you do differently? How would you prepare the church to live out its Christian faith in lock down?
- 2. Will you continue to offer some kind of online content to reach those who won't, or can't, come to a building on Sunday?
- 3. Could you work with other churches to share that additional work and pool your creative resources?
- 4. How do you express your Christian faith in the street where you live?

We hope that this final pack will be of help and encouragement as we continue to seek the Lord as one Baptist family throughout Wales during this difficult and challenging time. We would like to take this opportunity to thank all those who have contributed to the various prayer packs and all those who have joined us in the effort to make 2020 a year of renewed prayer.

REOPENING OUR CHAPELS





10 July 10 Welsh the Government announced that chapels could reopen for worship when it was safe to do so and guidelines were prepared for this purpose. The Union has now prepared a document which sets out some of the main aspects of what needs to be considered when preparing to reopen the chapel, and was sent to all Church Secretaries and Ministers at the end of July.

As an Union, we have encouraged churches not to rush into reopening but to take time to consider the full requirements and to aim at possibly reopening at the beginning of September.

Before opening the chapel a thorough **risk assessment** should be undertaken so as to minimise the risk of transmitting the virus. **Social distancing** and appropriate **hygiene** measures will need to be in place.

The Government guidelines should be followed and you should also seek further advice from your insurer.

Be realistic about what you can achieve and don't forget about those who will be continuing to self-isolate and unable to attend services. You might want to ensure that alternative worship arrangements are in place for the foreseeable future.


